Frontier Economics report a missed opportunity

Political uncertainty will continue to cast a long shadow

Last week, all eyes were on the Government's response to the Frontier Economics report on New Zealand's electricity market. The general feeling amongst many MEUG members is that the response was underwhelming. There were some good initiatives to improve security of supply, but nothing that will address affordability or competition within the next decade.

Earlier this year, the Northern Infrastructure Forum reported <u>survey results</u> that one in four businesses had limited or reduced production because of high electricity prices, and one in four businesses experienced job losses due to high electricity costs. Nothing in the Government's response will make any difference to the struggles of businesses and employers. In that sense, the Government's response can be viewed as a huge missed opportunity.

It is also a missed opportunity in that it did not resolve the political uncertainty that casts a long shadow over the electricity sector. Because issues relating to affordability or competition were not clearly addressed, we now have at least three political parties, on both sides of the political spectrum, that will campaign on electricity sector reform at next year's general election. And the substance of the relevant election year policies will likely be radicalised as a response to perceived inaction by the Government, as a means of political differentiation. We already know that nationalisation of generation assets and structural separation of gentailers will be on the table.

With the economy struggling to grow, the cost of living will be one of the defining issues at next year's election. Voters will be considering who to vote for off the back of 2026's annual transmission and distribution prices increases – and most voters will not differentiate between distribution costs driving increases in their electricity bills and increases from other sources. They will just be unhappy that their electricity bill keeps getting more expensive. Some of them will blame the Government for not doing anything about it (regardless of whether that perception is accurate or not).

Rather than resolving the political uncertainty that has hung over the market since the crisis last August, the Government's response to the Frontier Economics report has prolonged that uncertainty for another year. We would all have been better off if the Government's response to the Frontier Economics report went far enough to dispel this uncertainty. Failing to do so may go down as the greatest missed opportunity of all.
